
Little Pickles Covid 19 Specific Risk Assessment

We have put in place a system of controls to minimise the risk and to make our settings as safe as possible for children, staff, and families. This is following the Government Guidance Actions for early years and childcare providers during the coronavirus outbreak

25/9/20	 A staff member is unwell with symptoms of coronavirus (a new continuous cough or sudden loss or change of sense of taste or smell, or a sudden high fever) A child comes to the setting with symptoms of coronavirus Someone in the child's family has symptoms of coronavirus 	Children, staff, and other adults do not come into settings if they have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or have tested positive in the last 10 days	 Parents to provide regular updates on the health of their family/household Send home anyone with symptoms Take temperature on entry to nursery Parents to sign an initial health declaration Send parents the flowchart of illness and procedures to follow 	Daily check in with families as they arrive at the setting
	A staff member or child becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus, whilst at nursery	 Identify a separate space for children or adults who become unwell to use until they can go home Make sure there is cleaning equipment and PPE available within this area A face mask must be worn by the supervising adult as well as other PPE if contact is necessary The area should be well ventilated if possible The area must be thoroughly cleaned after use 	 Consider which separate space to use which has access to a toilet Check stocks of cleaning equipment and PPE 	Recheck weekly or after someone has become ill
2. Clean	your hands often			
25/9/20	Infection spreads easily from unclean hands	 Wash hands more often, particularly when arriving at the settings, after a break, changing rooms, after touching my face, blowing my nose, sneezing, or coughing, and before eating or handling food, Encourage children to wash their hands frequently Clean hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water and dry them thoroughly 	 Check stocks of soap and handwash as well as paper towels for drying Check stocks of hand sanitiser Practice handwashing routines with the children 	Regularly throughout the day

	•	Adults can use alcohol-based hand sanitiser, ensuring that all parts of the hand are covered Build these routines in setting culture Everyone to wash their hands as soon as they arrive at the nursery		
3. Respirat	tory hygiene (catch it, bin it, kill it)			
25/9/20	 Coronavirus can be transmitted by being in close contact with those sneezing or coughing Singing and role play producing droplet and aerosol risks 	Ensure the children follow these instructions: - Avoid touching your mouth, eyes, and nose Cover your mouth and nose with disposable tissues when they cough or sneeze If not available, sneeze into the crook of your elbow, not into your hand Dispose of tissues into a disposable rubbish bag Immediately wash your hands with soap and water	 Teach and support children to learn and follow this routine Ensure a good supply of disposable tissues and a 'tissue bin' Singing, dance and role play is to be encouraged as usual, but settings should keep any background or accompanying music to a low level to discourage children from raising their voices unduly 	Daily

4. Enhanced cleaning regime

25/9/20	Coronavirus can be transmitted on frequently touched surfaces/items	 Surfaces such as door handles, handrails, tabletops, play equipment, toys, devices (e.g. phones, tablets) must be cleaned often Follow the Public Health England (PHE) guidance on cleaning for non-healthcare settings - use the usual products (detergents and anti bac spray), as these are highly effective at getting rid of the virus on surfaces 	 Review cleaning plan - how often cleaning is carried out and what needs cleaning most often Where toys are shared, regularly disinfect them Ask children not to bring own toys into setting, unless necessary Only necessary items to be brought into the nursery, ie, nappies and milk bottles, and stored on children's individual pegs or in the appropriate area Staff and children to wear clean clothes every day to the nursery Consider using washable throws to cover soft furnishings that cannot be removed 	Before the settings open to children and at the end of the day

			 Identify where rubbish can be stored for 72 hours to avoid cross contamination Ensure packed lunches from home are brought in disposable packaging See cleaning schedule

25/9/20	 Larger bubbles More children attending the settings More families coming to the settings for drop off and pick up More adults working in the settings 	 Ensure correct adult to child ratios are adhered to and where possible, keep the groups separate Minimise the contact between groups to reduce the number of children and adults needed to self-isolate in the event of a positive test Parents not entering the settings daily One parent only at drop off or pick up Parents not to gather outside after dropping off 	 Advise walking or private transport to the settings is preferable and minimal use of public transport Ensure families know where to wait if they need to - markings on the ground Communicate handover information with parents via digital communications Phone, text or email new parents with arrangements Staff to adhere to social distancing with other adults in the settings Review fire safety policy 	Daily
25/9/20	Visitors to nursery	Visitors to follow our COVID-19 procedures Full contact details taken Temperature taken Wash hands Face mask (unless working with children) Hand sanitiser 2 metres social distancing Avoid close contact with children Wash hands before leaving	 Non-essential visits, ie, contractors, should take place after opening hours where possible External professionals follow procedures when visiting Show arounds should be child free and one adult and must follow all COVID-19 procedures when visiting Settling session to be no longer than an hour Prior to the visit, procedures to be emailed and explained how this impacts them and their responsibility during the visit Upon the arrival, visitors to be asked to declare that they are healthy Full contact details need to be collected for all visitors to enable track and trace 	Daily

25/9/20	Use of PPE when someone displays symptoms	 Staff do not require PPE beyond what they would use for their normal work PPE should be worn if two metres cannot be maintained from any child displaying coronavirus symptoms (whilst they are isolating at the nursery until they are picked up) 	 Ensure a supply of PPE is available for when it might be needed in the isolation area PPE to be used as usual when changing nappies or carrying out intimate care needs 	Weekly
25/9/20	Use of face masks	 Face masks must not be used for children under 3 in any circumstances Face coverings are not necessary when adults are engaging with children, even where social distancing is not possible. They can have a negative impact on interactions and communication and thus children's development if they are worn continuously Masks can be worn if adults cannot always maintain two metres from other adults, ie, when moving around in corridors and communal areas If visitors need to enter the settings, adults should wear a face mask 	 Visitors to wear their own face mask when coming for a settling session or visit See above in 'visitors to the nursery' 	Weekly and when visitor arrive

7. Engage with NHS test and trace

Date	Identify hazards	What can be done to remove or lessen the risk?	Action to take	Recheck
25/9/20	Adults and children displaying symptoms of COVID-19	 Anyone with symptoms should remain at home Self-isolate for 10 days Book a test as quickly as possible, either online through the NHS website, or by telephone via NHS 119 	 If a positive test, make available the details of anyone they have been in close contact if asked by NHS Test and Trace The settings will make available contact details as necessary Return to the settings after 10 days self-isolation and no longer showing symptoms 	

8. Manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the setting community

25/9/20

- A positive case of COVID-19
- Notify the Local Authority Public Health team via phnotifications@cornwall.gov.uk
- They will provide advice, help with risk assessment, and assist with communications if needed.
- Notify the DfE Helpline on 0800 046 8687 (select option 1). You will be put through to an NHS advice team.
- Send home the template letter provided by the local PHT
- Send home those who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive, advising them to self-isolate for 14 days since they were last in close contact with that person when they were infectious. Their household contacts do not need to isolate at this point
- Ensure that records are kept accurately including children and staff
- Notify OFSTED of a positive case on enquiries@ofsted.gov.uk

9. Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice

 or an overall rise in
 sickness absence
 where COVID-19 is
 suspected
 - Notify the Local Authority Public Health team via phnotifications@cornwall.gov.uk
 - They will provide advice, help with risk assessment, and assist with communications if needed.
 - Notify Public Health England on 0300 303 8162.
- Follow the advice and risk assessment given by Public Health England
- Ensure the cases are isolating at home for 10 days after the day of symptom onset.

 Household contacts should isolate for 14 days
- Only close the whole setting on the advice of health protection team
- The health protection team may recommend that a larger number of other children selfisolate as a precautionary measure
- Notify OFSTED if the nursery has to shut on enquiries@ofsted.gov.uk
 - If settings are implementing the controls from this list, addressing the risks they have identified and therefore reducing transmission risks, whole setting closure based on cases within the setting will not generally be necessary, and should not be considered except on the advice of health protection teams.

Whenever two or more confirmed cases arise within 14 days
